

2017 Mental Health Counselors

Overview

This Mental Health Counselors census is part of the Vermont Department of Health's healthcare provider data program, which is used to monitor and measure the supply of health care providers in Vermont over time. Vermont Mental Health Counselors are relicensed every two years. Data for this report were obtained during the January 2017 relicensing period and represent a snapshot of the profession at that time.

Mental Health Counselors diagnose and treat mental conditions, psychiatric disabilities, and emotional disorders; provide professional counseling services; and promote optimal mental health to individuals, couples, families, and groups. They are part of the allied mental health professional workforce in Vermont. To be licensed in Vermont, counselors must have completed a graduate degree with specific mental health counseling focus, have two years (at least 3000 hours) of supervised practice, and pass both the National Counselor Examination and the National Clinical Mental Health Counseling Examination.

Workforce

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH

- 725 Mental Health Counselors (MHCs) renewed their licenses during the census period and 719 completed the workforce survey for a response rate of 99.2%.
- Out of the 719 respondents, 618 (86.0%) indicated that they were active and providing direct patient care in Vermont as Mental Health Counselors.
- Of the 101 respondents currently reporting a non-active status, 36 (35.6%) indicated they planned to start providing direct patient care in Vermont within the next 12 months.
- The remainder of this report is based on the 618 Mental Health Counselors who reported being active and providing direct patient care in Vermont as Mental Health Counselors. One active respondent did not provide any site or hour information, so they were not included in totals of practice characteristics or FTEs.

Demographics

Gender

- 75.6% were female
- 24.2% were male

Age

- 27.3% of MHCs were younger than 45
- 19.3% of MHCs were 65 or older







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Education and Training

- All MHCs must have master's degree to be licensed.
 - o 2.8% (17) had a PhD.
- 88.5% completed their education in the Northeast.

Additional licenses

- Many MHCs maintained more than one mental health care license.
 - 141 were substance abuse and/or addiction counselors
 - o 10 were psychologists
 - o 1 was a psychoanalyst
 - o 3 were clinical social workers
 - O 5 were marriage and family therapists
 - O 1 was a board certified psychiatric nurse
 - O 4 were registered nurses

Practice Characteristics

Specialties

• Psychotherapy and cognitive behavioral therapy were the most common specialties.

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Access to care

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH

- 93.9% accepted new clients
- 87.3% participated in Medicaid
- 84.6% accepted new Medicaid clients
- Medicare does not reimburse mental health counselors directly so MHCs accepting Medicare must be able to bill using another provider type or provide services under supervision of a covered license type.
 - 24.0% participated in Medicare
 - o 22.9% accepted new Medicare clients

Number of practice sites

- 15.7% (97) of mental health counselors practiced at more than one location.
- 1.9% (12) of those practiced at 3 or more locations.

• For mental health counselors' main practice location, the most common setting was individual private practices, followed by outpatient mental health clinics.

- 132.6 FTEs, or 31.3% of total FTEs, were age 60 and older (207 individuals).

Blueprint Health Care Areas (see Appendix for details)

• Brattleboro (136.2), Morrisville (99.0), and Barre (95.3) Health Care Areas had the highest ratio of mental health counselor FTEs to population.

• Upper Valley, Rutland, and Windsor Health Care Areas had less than 30 FTEs per 100,000 population.

Mental Health Catchment Areas (see Appendix for details)

- Rutland Mental Health Services (RMHS) had the lowest ratio of 28.5 FTEs to 100,000 population.
- Highest ratio was 95.5 in Washington County Mental Health Services (WCMHS) area.



Current Experience and Future Plans

Median amount of time licensed in Vermont: 11 years

In the next 12 months

- 80.6% planned to continue working as they had been.
- 11.7% planned to increase their hours.
- 4.7% planned to reduce their hours.

Observations

- Response rate for the 2015 MHC census was 75.9% so most of the increases in FTEs and numbers in this report are due to the greater response rate in the 2017 census.
- Many counselors indicated a desire to serve Medicare clients, but an inability to do so due to their practice structure and Medicare's reimbursement and billing requirements.

Appendix

Active Mental Health Counselor

A mental health counselor who reported working in Vermont as such (regardless of how many hours) is considered active.

Census

The census was taken during the biennial mental health counselor relicensing process which ended on January 31, 2017. The data include all licensed mental health counselors except for new licensees enrolled less than three months before the renewal date (November 2016 – January 2017), as their license was valid until the next renewal date of January 31, 2019. Census questions available upon request.

Full Time Equivalent (FTE)

Full time is defined as 40 or more working hours in Vermont per week, 48 weeks or more per year. Reporting more than 40 hours per week is defined as <u>one</u> FTE regardless of the number of hours over 40 per week worked.

Health Care Areas

The Health Care Areas in this report are those used by the Vermont Blueprint for Health, an initiative working to transform the way primary care and comprehensive health services are delivered and paid for. It disseminates information on healthcare expenditures, utilization, and care quality measures within these regions (see http://blueprintforhealth.vermont.gov/). Data are available for other regional definitions from the Division of Health Surveillance. See the contact information at the end of this report.

Main Practice, Site, Setting, and Specialty

The main practice site, setting, or specialty of an individual refer to the practice site, setting, or specialty with the greatest number of reported annual hours.

Maps

For county map, colors define quartiles. The lowest 25% of FTE equivalents to population ratio is displayed in the lightest color, the middle 50% in medium, and highest 25% in the darkest color.

Weekly Hours

Average weekly hours is based on hours and weeks reported, adjusted to a full-time 48-week working year (hours * (weeks/48)). Thus, the average weekly hours for an individual working 40 hours a week for half the year (24 weeks) is 20.
